Thank you to all parents and community members who came out to support our CCS Farmer's Market throughout the summer and fall. We held a Farmer's Market at Rainbow Hall on July 23rd, Canora street festival on August 21, and at Canora Composite School on September 10, 2021. In total we were able to raise a little over \$1000.00 dollars. We will use this money to ensure the garden is sustainable and invest in our kitchen renovation.

History Of Our Garden

Agriculture is an essential industry in our province and community. We are passionate about teaching our kids the importance of agriculture and the opportunities it can offer. Additionally, one of our goals is to offer our students authentic and engaging learning opportunities through gardening. With the help of Canada's Farmer's Grow Communities Grant sponsored by Bayer in the total of \$2500, Nutrien Garden Grant in the total of \$2500, and lastly a \$3000 grant from Nutrients for Life we were able to purchase the supplies needed to build a garden shed, a garden, and purchase the necessary tools and equipment. Additionally, Leson's Funeral Home, Korol Farms, Danny Rakochy and a number of other businesses including Canora Home Hardware, Canora Greenhouse, and Logan Stevens Construction donated to our cause, helping our dream become a reality. Students in Construction 30 and PAA helped build the shed. Students in grade 9 shoveled the manure and helped build the garden equipment. The entire school including the grade 4's from the elementary school came to plant the garden in early June. We planted potatoes, corn, beets, pumpkins, peppers, cucumbers, dill, cabbage, radishes, watermelon, tomatoes, wild flowers, peas, carrots, turnips, swiss chard, lettuce, and zucchini to name a few.

Our Plan

Students will have opportunities to work and learn in the garden. They will learn to plant, maintain, and harvest the garden throughout the year. To ensure the garden is maintained, students receive an honorarium to weed the garden throughout the summer. This year Daylia Lukey, Methyl Trask, and Latifah Severight all helped maintain the garden and worked the community farmer's markets. Methyl and Daylia put in many hours, sometimes with family, helping to weed and pick produce. When we are able to get community members involved, our goal will be to have garden experts, and agricultural experts teach our students about gardening, soil science, plant science, and share their knowledge with us. We hope to plant fruit trees and native plants to Saskatchewan around our school yard, using the fruit for our classes and students to eat. Experts could come teach our students and staff about techniques such as grafting and pruning of trees, not to mention looking at traditional Indigenous teachings that incorporate different plant species in Saskatchewan.

What we need?

We are continuing to raise money and applying for grants this year. We are inquiring about installing an inground watering system and purchasing outdoor furniture for students to sit and enjoy the outdoors as they eat and learn. Our largest expense going forward is our kitchen renovation. A newly renovated kitchen would allow us to offer Food Studies courses and PAA courses that focuses on cooking and food preparation, enhancing our students' learning opportunities. The appliances alone will cost nearly \$100,000 but will ensure students at CCS will learn essential skills for life after secondary school. The kitchen would also help utilize our garden produce for classes offered and reduce cost for our lunch and canteen program. Having healthy and affordable options for students is a goal of ours. Any extra produce we had left this year and going forward would be sold to ensure our program is sustainable or donated to the Canora food bank. We were able to donate fresh produce to the food bank this summer.

Challenges We Faced

Every year we strive to learn how to improve our garden and how to utilize it. This year we planted a variety of vegetables that were ready in July, but without constant supervision some of this produce went to waste. Our students and staff will be reassessing what we plant next year to make the garden more manageable. Secondly, we were worried about the impact of animals on the garden. We did attract one or two deer but nothing major. Unfortunately, some community members believed that the garden was a community garden and helped themselves to the produce. Beets and cucumbers are a hot commodity in town! Luckily, we had donations and were able to sell quite a bit of produce to ensure we have the money to keep our garden program sustainable. We were also pleased with how respectful kids were with the garden throughout the school year. We love having the community involved but will need our own produce to achieve our goals and to ensure we can afford to plant the garden yearly.

Feedback

Customers and community members we talked to were ecstatic to see students working in the garden. Gardening is a lot of work, and it is a testament to our teachers who utilized the garden in their classrooms. From a teacher's standpoint, we started the year showing students the difference between corn and cucumber plants, weeds and vegetables, how to plant potatoes and what different seeds look like. It was amazing to see the garden grow and do as well as it did. All the businesses, teachers, and students that were involved in making it happen should be proud of what we accomplished in the first year.
