Hello,

Unfortunately we are not able to make an informational trip to your location this year, but we still wanted to provide your students with some basic information about the Forces, and specifically, our programs for Indigenous peoples.

As an overview, the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) has many roles and responsibilities, providing assistance within Canada and around the world. There are over 100 different jobs to choose from in the Forces, plus numerous fully subsidized education and training opportunities in either the <u>Regular Force (full-time</u> employment across Canada) or the <u>Primary Reserves (part-time</u> local employment in major city centres).

At this time I would like to highlight three Indigenous programs that fall under the banner of <u>Canadian</u> <u>Forces Aboriginal Programs (CFAP)</u>, which are available exclusively through the CAF. The first is a Primary Reserve program, the following two are intended for entry into the Regular Force:

- Indigenous Summer Training programs offer a choice between five programs that combine military lifestyle with cultural awareness. They are: Bold Eagle, Black Bear, Raven, Grey Wolf, and Carcajou. The courses offer a four-day culture camp which will focus on common spiritual beliefs, and are conducted by Indigenous elders. This is followed by a full-time five week Army Reserve Basic Military Qualification course taught by military instructors. Subjects include General Military Knowledge, Weapons Handling, Navigation, First Aid, Drill, and Survival Skills. Members are paid a wage of \$96.06 per day while on course. On completion of this course students are encouraged to continue working with the Primary Reserves, however there is no obligation to remain a member of the Forces. We recommend that people interested in this program apply early in the New Year, as the course is loaded on a first come, first served basis.
- The **Canadian Forces Aboriginal Entry Program** (CFAEP) is a three week program for those thinking about a full time career in the Forces. The program allows candidates to take part in exercises similar to what they would accomplish on a full Basic Training course, and learn about the long and proud history of Indigenous peoples in Canada's military without any obligation to join the Forces. During the course candidates will have an opportunity to prepare for and write the Canadian Forces Aptitude Test (CFAT), and will be counselled on potential career opportunities in the CAF that they may be eligible to apply for should they choose to continue into the Regular Force.
- The **Aboriginal Leadership Opportunity Year** (ALOY) is a highly positive, productive, one-year educational and leadership experience through the Royal Military College of Canada (RMC) in Kingston, Ontario. The ALOY program includes sports, field trips, leadership development, military training, cultural support activities, and individualized learning plans for pre-university (non-credit) and first-year university courses. Members are enrolled in the CAF for one year, paid as an Officer Cadet with a monthly salary of \$2,168, and receive free tuition and books from RMC. On completion of their contract these members may be provided the opportunity to continue on with a fully subsidized four year degree through the ROTP program (info below). The deadline for this program is 15 February every year, but applying early (September November) is recommended.



Outside of the Indigenous programs, there are two main ways to serve in the Canadian Armed Forces. The Regular Force involves full time employment across Canada, and the Primary Reserves offer part time local employment. The following options are offered in the Regular Force:

- The <u>Regular Officer Training Plan (ROTP)</u> is a **fully subsidized university program** available for competition among above- average academic students across Canada. Students enrolled in this program typically attend university at RMC in Kingston, ON, but may be offered a position at RMC Saint Jean, QC.
- The <u>Subsidized Training and Education Plan (STEP)</u> allows students to pursue a **fully subsidized technical college diploma** at select technical colleges across Canada. This is not available for all Non Commissioned Member (NCM) occupations, so we recommend that interested parties contact a Recruiter to find out more information.

• There is also an option for graduating students who wish to enter the workforce, learn new skills, and attain a career while earning a salary through the CAF. This is the most common mode of entry into the Forces, and members are trained in their chosen occupation by experienced military staff. More information can be found at https://forces.ca/en/careers.

We also offer part-time employment opportunities with the Primary Reserve, and employing units of the Reserves can be found in major city centres across Canada. This type of employment is ideal for current high school students (16 years of age or older), who may be interested in pursuing additional high school credits through the established Work Experience program, who are looking for full-time summer employment, or who wish to have rewarding part-time employment during the school year.

Each program in the CAF has their own requirements for eligibility, however as a minimum for all of our programs you will need to:

• Be a Canadian citizen;

• Be at least 17 years of age (16 for the Primary Reserve/Indigenous/paid education programs with parent/legal guardian consent under age of majority); and

Complete Grade 10 or Quebec Secondaire IV.

To apply for one of our Indigenous programs you must also be an Indigenous person (First Nations: status or non-status, Metis, or Inuit), and be in Grade 10 (with the expectation to complete Gr 10 by the end of the school year). For those students in Grade 10 we require a letter from the school to indicate that the student is expected to pass their classes, or attain a minimum of 8 credits at the Grade 10 level or higher.
